Harumi Abe

Harumi Abe's work is an evocative meditation on place, memory, and the passage of time. Through her landscape paintings, she constructs dreamlike spaces where Florida and Japan coexist, blending the real with the remembered. Her approach is deeply influenced by "shakkei," the Japanese concept of borrowed scenery, in which distant elements are seamlessly integrated into a garden's composition.

Abe applies this philosophy to painting, layering landscapes from her present surroundings with those of her past, creating a liminal space that straddles nostalgia and the ever-shifting present. Her compositions challenge traditional depth, bringing forms to the foreground and allowing saturated hues to command attention. Pictorial insets, shoji-like structures, and veiled perspectives hint at unseen realms, invoking both time and emotion. In this way, Abe's work becomes more than a depiction of landscape—it is an introspective exploration of the evolving relationship between identity and environment.

Alissa Alfonso

Alissa Alfonso is a Miami-based textile artist whose work focuses on the transformation of discarded materials into vibrant meditations on nature, memory, and environmental resilience. Raised in a family of craftsmen, her deep connection to Florida's landscape informs her practice, which merges art, sustainability, and education. She is the founder of Off the Canvas, an arts program fostering creative reuse in Broward County Schools. Using upcycled, hand-dyed fabrics, Alfonso crafts botanical soft sculptures and textile reliefs that evoke the essence of medicinal plants and fungi.

Repurposing found objects—beach plastics textiles, and organic forms—into works she highlights both abundance and loss. Vibrant yet melancholic, her pieces explore nature's vulnerability while offering symbols of regeneration and hope. By blurring the boundaries between art and ecological activism, Alfonso's work invites viewers to reconsider their relationship with the environment, celebrating the enduring beauty and resilience of the natural world.

Candice Avery | NAEMI Collection

Candice Avery, from Albion, Michigan, born in 1951, renders a remarkable technical precision as well as conceptual depth. Her hyperrealist drawings showcase an extraordinary attention to detail, capturing every nuance with meticulous accuracy. In contrast, her collages embrace a bold Pop aesthetic, layering historical imagery with text fragments such as "always," "waiting," "burn," and "love," creating evocative visual narratives.

A multifaceted creative force, she integrates elements of time, navigation, and cultural icons into her compositions, reflecting a deep engagement with memory and identity. Beyond her visual art, her background as a dancer and her career in television—working with ABC Network and Radio City Music Hall—inform her dynamic artistic language. Having lived in 34 states, her work is imbued with a distinctly American perspective, exploring the intersections of personal experience and collective history through striking visual storytelling.

Yochi Avin

Yochi Y. Avin is a multidisciplinary artist, born in Poland, raised in Israel and based in South Florida. She approaches art as a means of investigating personal and collective histories, drawing from early experiences of displacement and a transient lifestyle. Through painting, fiber art, and installations, she examines the tension between presence and absence, clarity and obscurity.

Her use of perforated surfaces and layered imagery evokes the way memories shift, fade, and reassemble over time. By embracing fragmentation, Avin creates spaces where the past and present intertwine, inviting viewers to engage with their own recollections. Introspection and a deep curiosity about the impermanence of experience, informs her narrative. Her work reflects a poetic meditation on the ways we carry, reconstruct, and reinterpret our histories.

Hermes Berrio

Hermes Berrío, born in 1980 in Colombia, is a Miami-based artist whose work explores identity, memory, and transformation, elevating everyday moments into monumental expressions. Rooted in personal history yet universally resonant, his paintings and sculptures blur the line between the ordinary and the extraordinary. Berrío's signature approach combines oil, aerosol, textiles, and gold leaf, creating rich, layered compositions that reflect both intimate experiences and broader cultural themes.

His sculptural works breathe new life into discarded objects—grocery carts, sneakers, and other urban relics—transforming them into powerful symbols of reinvention and aspiration. A self-described visual magpie, Berrío draws inspiration from street culture, social media iconography, and personal nostalgia, weaving them into a visual language that challenges perceptions of value, permanence, and representation. Through this interplay of materials and narratives, Berrío's art invites us to reconsider our own relationships with memory and identity, offering a vibrant commentary on transformation in an ever-changing world.

Duane Brant

Duane Brant's artwork includes collaborative projects, performance, installations, and using an extensive variety of media for both two dimensional and sculpture projects. A member of the art group, Kunstwaffen 2021 (German word translates to 'artificial weapons'), he creates spectacles using sound, dance and installation. From the personal to the political, the work has been an exercise through satire, humor and the absurd.

Brant has degrees from the University of Montana (BA, ceramics) and the University of Wyoming. (MFA, ceramics, performance, installation). He has been awarded museum grants, Fulbright Fellowships to UK and Japan, New Forms Regional Grant, Wyoming State Art Fellowship, with many projects documented and reviewed in national publications. His professional practice includes extensive practice through teaching, lectures, stage performances, workshops from an hour to one day, a week and longer, with events at universities, museums, community venues and international art festivals. Brant's work has been collected by private collectors and museums.

Pip Brant

Pip Brant's practice is a collision of painting, fiber arts, and the subversive potential of craft. Influenced by Bertolt Brecht's use of absurdity and humor, her work disrupts expectations, embedding layered narratives within pattern, texture, and form. A deep engagement with textiles—quilting, weaving, and surface design—intersects with painting, forging connections between traditional handcraft and contemporary visual culture. Brant's background, shaped by life on the western Plains Indian reservations and extensive travels, informs a practice that is as socially aware as it is playful.

Her work challenges perception, revealing the slippage between context and interpretation—what is seemingly innocuous can shift to something unsettling, and vice versa. By juxtaposing digital pixels with fabric, tradition with innovation, she creates a dialogue between past and present, technology and touch, reimagining the language of materials in a world saturated with shifting meanings.

Starsky Brines

Starsky Brines' work delves into the complexities of the human condition, seamlessly merging abstraction and figuration in a dynamic interplay of gesture, form, and color. His paintings do not follow a linear narrative but instead evoke emotional states, drawing from both personal introspection and broader universal themes. Brines' process is intuitive and organic, embracing spontaneity and accident as essential elements of composition.

His bold use of color and expressive energy create a visual language that is both raw and poetic, capturing the tensions between chaos and order, the primitive and the structured. His work invites viewers into a space of reflection, encouraging a deeper engagement with the shared human experience. Through his evolving practice, Brines continues to challenge conventions, reaffirming painting as a powerful means of exploration and connection in the contemporary art landscape.

Andres Cabrera-Garcia

Andres Cabrera-Garcia is a Cuban-born artist whose work examines identity, place, and belonging through the lens of landscape painting. Having lived and worked in Cuba, Spain's Canary Islands, and the United States, his artistic practice is deeply informed by migration and the evolving relationship between natural and urban environments. His work has been exhibited at the Deering Estate, Coral Gables Museum, and internationally in Switzerland, and he is the recipient of the Miami Individual Artist (MIA) Grant and the Broward Cultural Division Artist Support Regional Grant.

Through plein air studies and large-scale oil paintings, Cabrera-Garcia explores how landscapes—both untouched and transformed—reflect cultural identity and history. His work considers Florida's environmental and social fabric, investigating human intervention and its imprint on place. By capturing the shifting topographies of his surroundings, he invites viewers to reflect on their own sense of belonging and the ever-changing dialogue between nature and civilization.

Michele Del Campo

Michele del Campo is an Italian-born painter whose work explores human emotions, relationships, and the complexities of identity. With a Fine Arts degree and an MFA from Universidad Complutense de Madrid, along with studies in Illustration and Printmaking at the University of Dundee, his artistic practice is shaped by his global experiences. Del Campo's paintings capture moments of solitude, tension, and connection, emphasizing gesture and expression to convey emotional depth.

His work has been exhibited internationally, earning recognition such as the BMW Painting Prize, and has been featured in solo exhibitions across Spain, the U.S., the U.K., and Peru. Also an author, his book Pandemic Stories explores portraiture and storytelling, and he is currently developing Immigration Stories from Florida Artists with the support of an Artist Innovation Grant. Now based in Miami, he continues to draw inspiration from urban life, sketching and observing the world around him.

Pablo Cano, born in 1961 in Havana, Cuba, is a multidisciplinary artist known for his distinctive fusion of performance, sculpture, and printmaking. His work draws from a deep engagement with puppetry and marionette traditions, incorporating ceramics and kinetic sculpture to craft immersive theatrical experiences. Cano's artistic universe is a symphony of movement, music, and storytelling, where discarded materials find new life as animated figures.

His performances evoke a sense of wonder, blurring the lines between visual art and theatrical expression. Rooted in an exploration of the human condition, his creations embrace both whimsy and introspection, inviting us into a world where objects transcend their materiality. Based in Miami, Cano's work has been widely exhibited in museums and galleries, earning recognition for its inventive narrative approach. His practice stands as a testament to the enduring power of transformation—both of materials and ideas—within contemporary art.



Mabelin Castellanos

Mabelin Castellanos (Mabela) is a self-taught artist based in Miami. A scientist for over 30 years, she found solace in art after her career was cut short due to neurological issues in 2015. Creating art became an essential part of her healing journey, leading her to develop a unique practice of stitching everyday scenes into quilted compositions.

Drawing inspiration from the colors and patterns of fabric, she transforms cloth and thread into layered narratives, crafting quilted paintings without paint. Her imagined vignettes invite viewers to reflect on emotions, memories, and untold stories. Mabela's work has been widely recognized within the art community, earning her exhibitions in galleries across the country. Through her intricate, tactile pieces, she continues to explore storytelling, resilience, and the power of art as a transformative force.

Charles Clary

Charles Clary is a contemporary artist born in 1980 in Morristown, Tennessee. He earned his BFA in painting from Middle Tennessee State University and an MFA from the Savannah College of Art and Design. His work has been featured in exhibitions worldwide, including the CODA Museum Paper Biennial in the Netherlands and the Shanghai Paper Biennial.

Clary's themes are deeply personal, rooted in the loss of his parents to smoking-related cancers, which led him to explore Memento Mori, mortality, and the trauma of childhood. His work investigates how life's most significant events, such as trauma and death, force transformative decisions. Clary has received multiple awards, including the Top Prize at the 2016 ArtFields Competition. He is currently a Full Professor of Studio Art and Associate Chair of Visual Arts at Coastal Carolina University, where he continues to inspire students and push the boundaries of his medium.



Angelica Clyman

Angelica Clyman is is a multidisciplinary artist based in Hollywood, whose work explores the layered histories of place and memory. Engaging with painting, sculpture, installation, printmaking, and text, she investigates the evolving identity of South Florida's built and natural environments. Her work has been featured in solo exhibitions at South Gallery, BaCA West Gallery, and Miami Paper and Printing Museum, and she has held residencies at Bailey Contemporary Arts and Oolite Arts.

A South Florida Cultural Consortium Fellow, Clyman is also an educator and gallery director. Through her art, Clyman captures the life cycles of spaces—depicting their past, present, and potential futures within a single frame. Whether through painting or sculpture, she honors the remnants of forgotten places, transforming collective and personal memories into enduring visual narratives. Her works are both quiet reflections and powerful meditations on change, preservation, and the impermanence of place.

Nicole Combeau

Nicole Combeau is a photographer and educator whose work navigates storytelling, memory, and the deep ties between people, land, and heritage. Based in Miami, she focuses on overlooked narratives, particularly within matrilineal relationships, migration histories, and environmental resilience. Working primarily with medium and large format film, Combeau's images blend portraiture with landscapes, creating a visual dialogue between individuals and the spaces they inhabit.

Her practice is rooted in honoring resilience—whether capturing elders safeguarding cultural traditions, land stewards preserving fragile ecosystems, or working-class communities shaping their own legacies. Each frame carries an emotional weight, inviting viewers into moments of quiet intimacy and collective strength. Beyond her photographic work, Combeau leads workshops in visual storytelling, collaborating with institutions such as Pérez Art Museum Miami, O, Miami, and Arts for Learning. Her work is an act of recognition, remembrance, and an invitation to reflect on our shared histories and responsibilities.

Joanne Corry

Joanne Pilar Corry, born in New York and raised in Florida, draws profound inspiration from her early exposure to New York's galleries and museums. Her journey through varied environments—from the urban landscapes of New York to the natural beauty of Florida—has deeply influenced her artistic practice. She pursued painting at California College of the Arts, where she honed her distinctive style as an acrylic painter.

Known for her bold use of unusual color combinations and textured mark-making, Corry's work navigates themes of nature, human impact, and the complexities of the human experience. Her career took a significant turn in 2007 with the selection of four drawings for the "Undertow" exhibition in Istanbul, and she has since exhibited widely, including in the Coral Springs Museum of Art. Currently, her work is on display at Studio 18 in the Figure/Ground exhibit. Corry resides in Hollywood, with her husband and rabbit.

Damian Valdés creates a world where organic figures and dehumanized characters inhabit a vivid, often unsettling, natural environment. His drawings and paintings, marked by bold colors and expressive forms reminiscent of Matisse, present narratives that span from mystical covens to religious iconography, all filtered through his singular imagination.

Beyond painting, Valdés constructs intricate models of modern, fictional cities using recycled materials such as electronic components, casings, and pens. These sculptural works serve as speculative visions, challenging traditional notions of urbanism and proposing alternative ways of living. Through his diverse practice, Valdés explores the intersections of mythology, human existence, and environmental transformation.

Gregory Dirr

Gregory Dirr constructs a vast, multifaceted universe where painting, sculpture, and installation intertwine to depict characters, landscapes, and legends that blur the line between the real and the imaginary. His work explores the interplay between ecologies and their inhabitants, the paradox of seeking answers to the unknowable, and the subversion of traditional character archetypes. Chaos and tranquility coexist, inviting existential reflection. Through rich textures, layered imagery, and symbolic motifs, Dirr crafts dreamlike narratives that resonate on both a personal and collective level.

His art challenges perception, urging viewers to question their place within the broader cycles of nature and mythology. A storyteller at heart, he constructs visual fables that shift between whimsy and melancholy, exploring the fragile balance between creation and decay. His immersive worlds invite contemplation, prompting viewers to step beyond the surface and engage with the deeper, often elusive, truths woven throughout his work.

Her practice has continuously evolved alongside technological advancements, integrating both traditional and contemporary tools to create layered and visually dynamic compositions. Known for her striking collages and installation art, Elias explores the intersection of aesthetics and social consciousness, capturing urban tensions, raw emotions, and the complexities of contemporary life. Her work reflects a deep awareness of art history, often incorporating visual, emotional, and psychological impressions that translate into a unique and compelling artistic language.

By merging digital and physical mediums, she challenges perceptions of reality and transformation, emphasizing both the rawness and beauty of existence. Throughout her decades-long career, Elias has remained committed to her artistic vision, consistently pushing boundaries and offering thought-provoking perspectives that resonate with both personal and collective narratives.

Carlos Estévez



Carlos Estévez is a Cuban-born, Miami-based artist whose work explores human spirituality, philosophy, and the search for knowledge through painting, sculpture, drawing, and installation. His intricate, dreamlike compositions feature marionettes, celestial geometries, and surreal architectures, reflecting his fascination with the invisible forces shaping existence. For Estévez, art is an alchemical process—transforming mystery into understanding. Influenced by philosophy and personal experience, he uses visual storytelling to explore fundamental human questions. His meticulous attention to detail ensures that every color, texture, and symbol contributes to his narrative.

A recipient of prestigious grants, including the Joan Mitchell Foundation Award, Estévez has exhibited internationally at institutions such as the National Museum of Fine Arts in Havana and the Pérez Art Museum Miami. His work, housed in major museum collections, invites viewers into a metaphysical journey, bridging the visible and unseen realms of human experience.

Christian Feneck

Christian Feneck is a Fort Lauderdale-based artist with a Master of Architecture degree from the University of Florida. Drawing on his architectural training, Feneck integrates painting, print, and installation art to create immersive visual experiences that explore the perception of space.

His work merges the relativity of color and architectural perspective to construct ephemeral, sensorial places that engage the viewer's sense of vision. Feneck's paintings employ perspective conventions and the extreme relativeness of color to form dynamic transitions and distortions. His process includes the use of screen tone patterns and personal iconographs, blending the boundaries of painting and architecture. Through his practice, Feneck emphasizes visual perception as a fundamental tool for understanding both our built environment and the spaces we inhabit, offering a profound exploration of how we experience and engage with the world around us.

Chris Fox Gilson's work draws from his diverse career, including his experience as a New York advertising agency partner, filmmaker, author, and virtual reality pioneer. His unique perspective on disruptive social and technological change deeply informs his art. Since beginning his artistic journey 14 months ago, Gilson has gained significant recognition, being named "Best Artist" in Art Estate's Art Basel Issue and exhibiting internationally in locations such as South Florida, the U.K., Paris, and Qatar.

His work challenges perceptions of cultural and social habits shaped by tradition, inviting viewers to rethink established ideas through innovative artistic strategies. In his Old Masters 2.0 and Old Masters of AI series, Gilson speculates about the role of technology in art creation, imagining that historical figures like Da Vinci, Van Gogh, and Dali might have used AI to refine their masterpieces. His work raises important questions about the future of art, technology, and human connection.

Gabriela Gamboa



From earthquakes and hurricanes to rising seas and geopolitical instability, her art meditates on how life in the modern world remains fragile yet enduring. Grodin's work proposes a contemporary vision of a world that is both global and territorial, where human intervention and nature collide. Her installations, exhibitions, and experimental projects transform everyday spaces, offering audiences a new perspective on the delicate balance between creation and destruction.

His recent work also engages with termite-eaten wood and the insects themselves, exploring natural patterns as a form of mark-making. By participating in every stage of the making process, from milling raw lumber to executing precise digital interventions, Jenkins uncovers new relationships between material and environment. His work challenges perceptions of permanence and invites a deeper engagement with the natural and built world.

The deliberate placement of objects—chosen for their resonance rather than traditional iconography creates an element of cognitive dissonance, pushing viewers to reconsider the emotional and psychological weight of the everyday. His work acts as a bridge between personal narrative and universal themes, offering a contemplative space where the ordinary becomes profound.



Artem Mirolevich

His work has been exhibited in over 100 solo and group exhibitions worldwide, featured in major publications such as The New York Times, The Washington Post, and The Wall Street Journal, and graced the covers of books, music albums, and theater posters. Through drawing, etching, and collage, Mirolevich explores themes of human existence, civilization, and transformation. His apocalyptic yet hopeful worlds challenge viewers to contemplate the fundamental question: What defines our humanity?

Kim Moore

Kim Moore is a visual artist based in Miami whose work is deeply personal and process driven. Working in series, she navigates different stages of completion simultaneously, allowing each piece to evolve organically. Moore's artistic journey is inextricably linked to her lived experience, and recent works reflect her intimate engagement with health, resilience, and the intersection of personal and political realities.

Following her diagnosis with invasive breast cancer, she turned to her art as a means of processing and reclaiming her story—printing mammogram scans onto fabric, layering them with embroidery, and transforming clinical imagery into poetic reflections on the body, survival, and the healthcare system. Beyond the studio, Moore is an advocate for civil rights, particularly within the LGBTQ community, and is actively involved in legislative efforts to protect vulnerable youth and adults. Her dedication to social justice, combined with her commitment to artistic expression, defines her work as both a personal and communal act of resistance and reimagining.

Iriana Muñoz



Each fold and angle reacts to shifting light, creating a dance of shadows and movement that changes with the viewer's perspective.

Her vibrant, eco-friendl materials are carefully chosen not just for their durability but for their ability to breathe life into geometric forms. In a remarkable achievement, her work is set to leave Earth entirely, as part of the Lunar Codex project, which will send her art to the moon in 2025. Through her intricate sculptures, Muñoz invites us to pause, observe, and find beauty in the unseen patterns that shape our world.

Her images—unvarnished, intimate, and deeply human—trace a life lived on the margins, where art and survival are inextricably linked.

Nolan's photographic journey began in the projects, balancingdomesticity with an irrepressible need to create. With shoplifted film and a relentless eye, she built a body of work that speaks to resilience, love, and the passing of time. Her practice, shaped by instinct and experience rather than convention, finds depth in imperfection and poetry in the mundane. Today, her work is collected by major institutions while remaining rooted in the authenticity and immediacy that first defined it.



Katya Neptune



She has exhibited at the Museum of Florida Art & Culture, Coral Springs Museum of Art, and Bailey Contemporary Arts. Her work has been featured in the Sun Sentinel and Broward Palm Beach New Times. Neptune's art is process-driven and intuitive, navigating the intersections of spirituality, memory, and emotional landscapes. Through vulnerability and authenticity, she challenges stigma and fosters connection, inviting viewers into a deeply personal yet universal conversation.

Glexis Novoa

Glexis Novoa, born in Holguín, Cuba, is an acclaimed artist whose practice delves into the aesthetics of power, focusing on the intersection of social history, politics, and modernity. A key figure in the 1980s Cuban Art Renaissance, Novoa co-founded the Provisional group, which pioneered performance, political activism, and collectivist strategies. Known for his masterful graphite drawings on marble and site-specific graphite wall pieces, his work examines architecture, ideology, and power structures, using abstract iconography to critique political rhetoric.

His investigation into marble as a medium connects to the history of power, as the material was traditionally used in architecture to symbolize authority. Novoa's work has been exhibited globally, including at the Worcester Art Museum, Reina Sofia National Museum in Madrid, and the Queens Museum in New York. His work is held in collections like the Cisneros Fontanals Art Foundation and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston.

Edison Peñafiel, an Ecuadorian-American artist exposes the raw undercurrents of contemporary society, revealing the cycles of power, migration, and struggle that define our world. Through immersive installations that blend sculpture, video, and sound, Peñafiel creates environments that confront viewers with the fractured realities of marginalized lives. Drawing from German Expressionism and the aesthetics of surveillance, his work evokes tension, using sharp contrasts and distorted perspectives to reflect the vulnerability of those shaped by socio-economic, political, and historical forces.

In pieces like Barrio Alto, Peñafiel explores themes of displacement, alienation, and survival, transforming art into an act of disruption. His installations compel viewers to step into disorienting spaces where reality and illusion blur, forcing active engagement with the oppressive systems at play. By distorting perspectives and manipulating space, Peñafiel challenges us to reconsider history, prompting a deeper confrontationwith the forces that shape identities and collective experiences.

Sebastian Ferreria Martinez de la Pera NAEMI Collection

Sebastian Ferreria Martinez de la Pera was born in Asunción, Paraguay. Deeply captivated by the architectural and cultural vibrancy of the contrasting larger cities such as Madrid, Paris, Rome, Seville, and Córdoba, his work reflects an exploration of urban landscapes. Through the analysis of photographs, postcards, magazines, and digital archives, he constructs intricate depictions of modern metropolises, charting their avenues, roundabouts, and transit systems with remarkable precision.

A dedicated researcher, he relies on the Internet as an essential tool, sourcing high-resolution imagery to reinterpret and reconstruct the cityscape through his unique visual language. His process is defined by an obsessive attention to detail—his "horror vacui" compels him to fill every inch of the canvas, ensuring that no space remains untouched. For Martinez de la Pera, a work is only complete when every previous mark has been revisited and transformed, a testament to his relentless pursuit of urban expression.

Pedro Pablo Bacallao Perdomo NAEMI Collection

Pedro Pablo Bacallao Perdomo's work is deeply rooted in personal history and the stark realities of his surroundings. Born in Havana in 1980, his child-hood was marked by isolation due to frequent epileptic seizures, leading him to develop a rich inner world fueled by observation. His art reflects both the remnants of his childhood imagination and the harsh urban decay of his neighborhood, where themes of death, drugs, and desolation persist.

He uses collage as his foundation and layers pages from publications with his own writings, merging them with bold paint strokes and raw pen work. His figures are rough, almost naïve in approach, yet their visceral presence carries an unsettling intensity. Perdomo's artistic process serves as both an expressive release and a means of confronting his environment. Though he initially pursued literature and electronics, it was in painting and writing that he found true expression and purpose.

Deborah Perlman



Deborah Perlman is a South Florida-based artist whose dynamic, abstract geometric sculptures blur the line between the real and the imagined. With a BFA in Sculpture from Boston University and an MFA from Cranbrook Academy of Art, Perlman has exhibited nationally, including three solo shows from 2023–2024. Her work transforms flat, two-dimensional images into tactile, three-dimensional forms that pulse with texture, shadow, and movement.

By meticulously cutting, scoring, and folding paper, then combining it with wood, metal, and photographs, Perlman creates intricate, architectural pieces that invite the viewer into a world full of mystery and possibility. Inspired by African sculpture, Constructivism, Cubism, and artists like Louise Nevelson and M.C. Escher, Perlman's work addresses both personal and global concerns—from environmental crises to the quest for inner peace. Each piece serves as a metaphor for navigating the complexities of life, encouraging us to explore the spaces between certainty and doubt, reality and fantasy. Through her work, Perlman invites us to reflect on our shared human experience and the world we inhabit.

A signature member of the Colored Pencil Society of America (CPSA), UK Colored Pencil Society (UKCPS), and a member of several prestigious international art organizations, Ramadan has participated in numerous national and international exhibitions. His work is known for its vibrant use of color and intricate detail, creating artwork that moves between extreme realism and abstract impressions.

Ramadan's creative process, rooted in colored pencil, offers a therapeutic experience, allowing him to enter a state of "flow" while exploring cultural themes, the beauty of nature, and the fundamental elements of life. Through his art, Ramadan aims to shift perspectives, telling stories that encourage viewers to see the world in a new light.



Juan Sebastian Restrepo



Donna Ruff

Inspired by a trip to Southern Spain, her recent series features gold leaf, burning techniques, and acrylics on copper and wood panels.

These pieces emphasize both foreground and background, creating a balanced visual tension. Ruff has exhibited widely, with recent solo shows at FIU MBUS Gallery and Jack Fischer Gallery. Her work is included in collections such as The Morgan Library, The Library of Congress, and the Victoria & Albert Museum. She has received numerous prestigious awards, including the Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant.

Roger Sadler explores the overlooked beauty of urban life, capturing garages, shopping malls, freeways, and cars through his lens. His photography transforms the ordinary into a subject of artistic inquiry, revealing the "invisible" within the "visible." More recently, he has expanded his practice to include collages composed of objets trouvés, further investigating themes of perception and context. While his work conveys layered messages, Sadler leaves space for interpretation, inviting the viewer to construct meaning.

His artistic journey began with drawing and painting, but his breakthrough came with Portraits of the Mentally Sick (1978–1982), a series of sharpy executed portraits that humanized individuals often marginalized by society. Whether working in drawing, collage, or photography, Roger Sadler maintains a commitment to capturing the complexity of everyday existence with a precise yet empathetic eye.

Samantha Salzinger

Samantha Salzinger constructs worlds that exist in the delicate space between reality and illusion. Through meticulously crafted dioramas that become photographs and videos, she examines the seductive nature of consumer culture and the hidden consequences of excess. Her work lures the viewer in with vivid, dreamlike landscapes—sugar-coated, glowing, and enticing—only to reveal an undercurrent of environmental degradation and overindulgence.

Rooted in both the handmade and the hyperreal, Salzinger's practice explores the tension between authenticity and artifice. Her images evoke the language of advertising and fantasy, where desire is manufactured, and beauty often conceals deeper costs. Influenced by both historical landscape painting and contemporary digital aesthetics, she constructs spaces that feel simultaneously familiar and otherworldly, pushing the viewer to question what is natural, what is artificial, and where those boundaries blur. At its core, her work is about seduction—the power of visual pleasure to both captivate and deceive. It is an invitation to look closer, to examine the ways in which we consume images, objects, and even nature itself.

Raul Santos

Raul Santos' work is a study in precision, rhythm, and the transformative power of color. Deeply attuned to materiality, Santos engages wood as a primary surface, drawing on childhood memories of building tree forts—spaces where salvaged materials became vessels for imagination.

His work extends beyond traditional painting into furniture, ceramics, and sculpture, seamlessly merging street art's raw energy with the discipline of design. With an intuitive approach to color and form, Santos constructs immersive experiences that blur the lines between the functional and the meditative. Each piece serves as a portal—inviting contemplation, movement, and a sense of connection to place, material, and memory.

Gretchen Scharnagl

Gretchen Scharnagl, born in Greenwich, Connecticut and based in Miami, holds an MFA from Florida International University. As an eco-materialist and bricoleur, her work blends installation, mark-making, and semi-performative elements, with a strong commitment to sustainability. Her bricoleur practice involves repurposing found and recycled materials, often transforming them into art through a process of creative problem-solving.

Scharnagl's use of these materials reflects a deep connection to the environment and a critique of consumerism, demonstrating how discarded objects can find new life. Scharnagl's work focuses on the intersection of humanity and nature, drawing inspiration from local ecosystems in Miami, including the Deering Estate, Everglades National Park, and the Florida International University campus, where she teaches. Through her sustainable and hands-on approach, she seeks to inspire others to reconnect with nature and adopt eco-conscious practices, all while engaging in a meaningful dialogue on the beauty of our earth.

Dennis Scholl

Dennis Scholl is South Florida based visual artist and filmmaker whose work navigates the intersections of memory, history, and cultural iconography. A recurring structural motif in Scholl's work is the dodecagon, a twelve-sided form referencing cycles of time—the clock, the zodiac, and the calendar year. His recent series, created on hotel stationery sourced during his travels, plays with notions of temporality and geometric progression. By methodically altering each composition within the series, he constructs a visual dialogue between systematic order and personal experience, inviting viewers to reconsider how history, memory, and place intersect in the everyday.

Ali Shrago-Spechler

Her practice spans painting, sculpture, installation, and participatory social actions, blending humor and historical reflection to create spaces that feel both familiar and strange. Using materials like cardboard—both a vessel of memory and a symbol of impermanence—she reconstructs lost histories, inviting audiences to physically engage with her work. Her installations act as sites for collective storytelling, where nostalgia and memory become tools for questioning personal and cultural narratives. By intertwining sentimentality with critical inquiry, Shrago-Spechler transforms historical fragments into interactive experiences that challenge viewers to reconsider the past's influence on the present.




